Elcan Jefferson Scholars Foundation Distinguished Professorship in Artificial Intelligence **Position Description**



The Opportunity

The College and Graduate School of Arts & Sciences at the University of Virginia seeks an eminent scholar whose research and teaching center the development, use and implications of Artificial Intelligence, or whose work meaningfully engages AI technologies such as large language models. Disciplinary affiliation is open, and the successful candidate will be appointed in the relevant department of Arts & Sciences. We are particularly interested in scholars working in the following areas:

Al and Climate – the development and application of Al to the study of Earth's climate, including climate modeling and prediction; water scarcity and/or extreme weather forecasting; and impacts on ecosystems, agriculture, and food security.

Al and Computational Humanities – critical engagement with large language models and computational methods to address humanistic concerns such as aesthetics, identity, ethics, and justice; explore the impacts of Al on art, history, literature, and culture, including machine translation in archival and literary studies; and contribute to UVA's institutional strengths in the digital humanities (DH).

Al, Mind and Language – the role and nature of human language in generative Al, from training data to conversational interfaces; the relationship of Al to the mind, including how Al informs our understanding of creativity, intelligence, and language and how it can be used to study human cognition; the instrumentalization of human language and the impacts of Al on linguistic communities, including linguistic diversity and low-resource languages in a global context; computational cognitive science; and issues of Al access, disability, and inclusion.

Al and Ethics – the role of Al in ethical decision-making, including general Al models of moral inquiry and reasoning and applied questions about the use of Al in highly sensitive ethical contexts such as medicine and warfare; and the broader ethical impacts of Al on human society, including algorithmic bias, the future of work, and the impact of Al on youth.

UVA AI Initiatives

Al-related research is taking place in all twelve of UVA's schools. To support researchers, practitioners, and students working within and beyond disciplinary boundaries, the University has established a collaborative and dynamic network of labs, initiatives, and institutes engaged in cutting edge work related to Al. This network includes the Al-Powered Astronomy Institute, the LaCross Institute for Ethical Artificial Intelligence in Business, the Digital Technology for Democracy Lab, the National Security Data and Policy Institute, and the Biocomplexity Institute and Initiative.

The University has also accelerated its hiring in Al. This year, the Provost's office announced the allocation of 10 endowed chairs for strategic hiring in Artificial Intelligence. Several of these new hires will be housed in the College and Graduate School of Arts & Sciences.

Jefferson Scholars Distinguished Professorships

For more than four decades, the Jefferson Scholars Foundation has served a mission to identify, attract, and nurture individuals of extraordinary intellectual range and depth who aim to enhance the University community.

In 2012, the Foundation underscored this mission by launching the Jefferson Scholars Foundation Distinguished Professorship Program. Designed to help UVA attract the world's most outstanding professors, the Distinguished Professorship Program supports nationally and internationally recognized scholars and leaders in their fields, known for their superior abilities as both classroom teachers and innovative researchers. Having secured approximately \$195 million to support this effort, the Foundation has been able to attract outstanding talent to the College of Arts & Sciences, the School of Education and Human Development, the Darden School of Business, the Law School, the McIntire School of Commerce, and the School of Medicine.

Chairholders are expected to demonstrate a strong commitment to teaching and to participate actively in the Foundation's community by serving on Foundation selection committees, attending Foundation events, and helping the Foundation recruit Scholars and Fellows.

The University and the Foundation expect the holders of the Professorships to be:

- Nationally and internationally recognized scholars and leaders
- Superior classroom teachers who are eager to engage with students
- Dynamic lecturers
- Leading-edge researchers in their fields
- Willing to participate actively in the Foundation community by serving on selection committees, attending Foundation events, and helping the Foundation recruit Scholars and Fellows
- Individuals whose presence on the faculty will help attract other outstanding colleagues to UVA
- Individuals who embrace interdisciplinary collaboration and recognize its value to the creation of new knowledge
- Active in, and involved citizens of, the University community

Qualifications

The holder of an endowed chair is receiving one of the most prestigious honors that can be bestowed on a University of Virginia faculty member. The highest levels of performance, and national and international recognition of that performance, are inherent guidelines for appointment of a chair holder. The institutional expectation of unquestionable excellence means that the person is deemed to have achieved the highest stature and exemplary accomplishment in a discipline or area of research as judged by an independent assessment of his or her peers. In certain instances, accomplishment may be judged on the basis of distinguished work for which there is peer consensus of superior achievement whether in teaching, service or in accomplishments which lie beyond strictly academic endeavors. Excellence should be evidenced by several years of outstanding performance based on national and international standards.

Faculty selected for each Professorship must meet the University's minimum criteria for an eminent scholar professorship. In addition, the University will attempt to identify candidates who meet the following criteria desired by the Jefferson Scholars Foundation and its benefactors:

- National and international recognition as scholar and leader;
- Demonstrated excellence as a teacher;
- Strong commitment to interdisciplinary collaborations; and
- Willingness to participate actively in the Jefferson Scholars Foundation community.
